James Johnson Project Manager – Landscape Campus Services University Architect



Being recognized for his work on the Emory Campus Master Plan a n d Land Use Classification Plan. James brings dedication and design to his position a s professional landscape architect. However, he should also bе applauded for the other where areas he

continually makes a difference.

James has been instrumental and ground breaking in his work with the Committee on Environment and the emergence of Emory as an environmental campus leader. He also provides special services to the Real Estate development team as well as the Office of the Executive Vice President for Finance and Administration during times of new project initiation and development.

Serving on the Public Art Committee, he is the point of implementation and assistance with the work to bring outdoor sculpture to campus. For several years, James has partnered with the Georgia Tech Civil Engineering Department in a program that creates real world senior thesis projects and professional review. Then if this wasn't enough, he is also an active member of the Friends of Emory Forest and is currently facilitating the work at the Burbank Park for Emory Village.

Gary Morris Plumbing Coordinator Campus Services – Facilities Management

Gary demonstrated commitment to Emory University is second to none according to his peers. He is being recognized for his contributions to ensuring continuous water service to Emory as well as its neighbors.



Over the past several years, Gary has acquired

pipe-freezing equipment allowing for the freezing of water during water outages so that repairs and tie-ins can be made while critical campus buildings remain in service. This also allows work to occur during normal working hours, which translates into notable cost savings.

Another method that Gary actually developed to continue service during water outages is the use of fire hoses to connect fire hydrants to building water service lines. Customers are frequently not aware that there is a water main outage thanks to Gary's

elaborate plans.

So as not to leave anyone without water, Gary takes the initiative to check with private contractors and county personnel when he observes them digging on or near campus – helping the University as well as Emory University Hospital, Egleston Children's Hospital and the Emory Clinics avoid service interruption.

Three clicks to a carpool: Web site can help commuters share the ride

Emory University's new ride-matching program, Destination Emory (<u>www.destination.emory.edu</u>), can help commuters find their perfect carpool commute match.



Destination Emory allows commuters to find the 25 University employees who live closest to them, and identifies the general location of those residences with a dot on the Web site's map. The employee listing also includes their work location on campus, so potential carpoolers can travel to the same section of campus, if they choose.

Prospective carpoolers can send a blind e-mail to those who might make a convenient carpool match. The web site may also be used to connect those who wish to start a vanpool and walk or bike to work.

If the recipient of the e-mail has an interest in discussing commuting options, they can reply and at that time disclose their identity. If they are not interested, they simply ignore the e-mail and their identity is never revealed.

Remembering Lynette Braithwaite (1950 - 2007)

On Thursday, March 29, 2007, **Lynette Lorraine Braithwaite-Luthers**, born July 19, 1950 in Georgetown Guyana, embarked upon her next journey of life.

Having a career helped her in her mission to be a supportive mother for all of her children, whom she loved dearly.

Recipient of numerous accolades, Lynette was the well-deserved winner of the 2006 Sam Brown award. Hard working, conscientious and proactive are words that her supervisor and customers used to describe her work on her nomination ballot. Teacher, friend and family are words from her coworkers.

She was notorious for her culinary skills and fashion expertise. Lynette was a fabulous seamstress that never needed a pattern – she could make anything from her pure creative eye. "One year, I'd entered the fashion show at the holiday party, and didn't win," recalls dear friend and

coworker **Audrey Wilson**. "When I sat back down, Lynette told me, 'That's okay girl, next year I'm going to show you how to walk!' and sure enough, she did. She had the best eye for clothes, and used to try to teach me to dance."

Her supervisor, **William Cash** fondly remembers the Christmas luncheons their group held each year. "Last

year, I considered cancelling it. Lynette convinced me that we had to have it, she helped cook and we all really enjoyed ourselves. I think it was the best one we'd ever had."

"I went to the hospital to visit her," coworker **Rosa Welch** stated. "We prayed together, and she asked after her mother, children and coworkers. Even then, she was genuinely concerned about others."

Though clearly painful, every memory of Lynette is sure to bring a smile to the faces of those who knew and loved her. Even in her most difficult times, she found a way to make others smile, laugh or just let them know she cared. Truly a beautiful spirit, she blossomed into a social butterfly, touching the lives of many with her candor

and kindness. In a world of façade, she maintained her integrity. Lynette took life by the horns and rode it out – she truly lived life to the fullest.

"One of the last things she said to me," said **Audrey**, "was to really live my life...she just made you feel like you could do anything. It was wonderful to have a friend you could trust, who was always there for you no matter what. I'll really miss her." We all will. Rest in peace, Lynette.



New Arrival: Karen Salisbury


Please welcome Karen Salisbury to Campus Services.

Stereotyping has been at the *root* of some of the worst crimes against humanity in all of recorded history. That particular root is used in mass media, including but not limited to, broadcast, cable, print and internet.

The root has been used politically and as propaganda during times of war. That evil root is the *STEREOTYPE*, which probably goes back beyond recorded history. It has been used to justify inhumane actions such as slavery, colonization, and genocide.

known how mass media, particularly cinema, used stereotyping to create enough bias against Jewish people to bring about an attitude of acceptance of the holocaust.

During World War II, thousands of American citizens were put into internment camps. They were American citizens of Japanese

Driving University Owned Vehicles

The following are requirements for drivers of Emory owned or leased vehicles:

- Emory will obtain an annual *driving record check* for all employees who drive Emory vehicles.
- Employees will be required to successfully complete the Emory *Defensive Driving Course* every three years.
- Employees must apprise management of driving or license violations. Drivers must report any change in the status of their driving record to their supervisor immediately.
- *Cell phones* should not be in use while the vehicle is in motion.
- Seat belts must be worn by all occupants of the motor vehicle at all times the vehicle is in motion. Drivers may not transport more persons than can be safely accommodated by the available seat belt system.
- Vehicles are considered *no smoking* areas. Drivers are responsible for ensuring that all occupants of the vehicle observe the no smoking policy.
- Drivers shall be *drug and alcohol free*. This includes prescription and non-prescription drugs that may impair

- a driver's judgment or faculties.
- Drivers must observe all traffic regulations. Drivers are personally responsible for any traffic citations that may be issued as a result of operating a university vehicle.
- ◆ Drivers must avoid driving if conditions are hazardous. If there is any question about hazardous conditions, drivers must call their supervisors for instructions.
- Drivers are responsible for the safety and security of the vehicle until it is safely returned to the designated university location.
- Drivers must report all incidents, including collisions, citations or other accidents, to their supervisors immediately. Any accidents that result in personal injury must be reported to Risk Management and the Workers' Compensation Department immediately.
- Emory owned or leased vehicles will be operated for *Emory business or activities only*. Personal use of Emory vehicles is prohibited at all times.

EMORY SCORES WELL AT RECYCLEMANIA

Over the past several weeks, Emory participated in a nation wide recycling competition called RecycleMania. Below are Emory's rankings:

- ♦ 17th out of 77 schools with a 33% cumulative recycling rate in the Grand Champion competition—a competition for schools that participate in both the Per Capita and the Waste Minimization competitions. The grand champion excelled in source reduction, waste prevention, and recycling, and exemplified a more holistic view to the school's waste reduction efforts.
- ♦ 10th out of 175 schools with 57 lbs. of recyclables/person in the Per Capita Classic which is the traditional RecycleMania competition format in which schools compete to see who can collect the most recyclables.
- 4th out of 111 schools with 25 lbs of paper/person in the Paper recycling competition which is a competition to see which school recycles the most paper.
- ♦ 7th out of 178 schools with 971,360 cumulative lbs. in the Gorilla Prize which is the school with the most cumulative pounds of recyclables over the 10 week period.
- ♦ 63rd out of 66 schools with 172 lbs. of waste/person in the Waste Minimization competition which focuses on overall waste reduction instead of recycling. In the waste minimization competition, schools will compete to see who can generate the lowest waste per capita, which includes both trash and recycling.
- 15th out of 112 schools with 8.5 lbs. of bottles and cans/person in the Bottle and Can Recycling competition.

Two other competitions were held on campus over the past few weeks:

- Emory Recycles held a 6 week competition between residence halls that ended recently. Each hall competed to see who could recycle the most. The winner will receive a catered party before exams begin.
- Greeks Go Green was a 4 week competition between the sororities and fraternities that started in late March. The first week's competition focused on paper recycling, the second on energy use, the third week on aluminum recycling and the fourth on "pop-top" collection. The sororities and fraternities were randomly paired up; winners won free laundry for a week.
